
## Bass Lines and Partial Chords

# Partial Chords

If you have trouble playing a certain chords because your fingers won't get into the proper position, instead of playing the full 4 string chord, you can modify it by playing only 3 strings or 2 strings, and leaving out the strings that you can't do the frets for.

This also means strumming only the strings that you have the proper fingering for.

# Example

G chord – you may have trouble playing the G chord which is 0232.



If you have trouble reaching the 2<sup>nd</sup> fret of the C string,

you could play only the fingering for the E & A strings, and strum just these 2 strings.

This is called an interval, because it is only 2 notes.

This will allow you to play a partial chord when you can't play the full chord.

Use this method for other chords when the fingering is a problem for you.

## Simple Bass and Scale Lines

(reference the note chart above)

A simple way to start learning to pick melodies is to play the first few notes of the scale of the chord the song calls for.

If the song has a G chord – the first few Notes of the G scale are -

G - open G string, A - G string  $2^{nd}$  fret, B - G string  $4^{th}$  fret, which is a Do, Ra Me, of the G scale.

This could be played with quarter notes as G-A-B-A to get 4 counts for the bar.

You may play this 2 or 4 times, depending on how many bars the chord is held for.

If the song moves to a C chord – the first few notes of the C scale are -

C – open C string, D – C string  $2^{nd}$  fret, E – open E string, which is the Do, Ra, Me, of the C scale. Try these notes as quarter notes C – D – E – D to make one bar.

If the song has an F chord – the first few notes of the F scale are -

F - E string 1<sup>st</sup> fret, G - E string 3<sup>rd</sup> fret, A - open A string, which is the Do, Ra, Me of the F scale. Try them as quarter notes F - G - A - G

Then play the 3 scales notes instead of the playing the chords of the song. This will take some practise, so maybe spend a few minutes on it, each time you practise.
